

All Around Match News



There are two items for this month. First, we held the first **All Around Match** day on Saturday June 30th. Despite the heat, the shooting and camaraderie went on until after 4 p.m. at which point we postponed the shotgun portion until Sunday morning- hoping for a break from the heat. No such luck. It was just as hot and even more humid. We shot until common sense prevailed at noon, and decided to wait for a cooler day.

The second item is the **change in the shotgun rules**. To make it easier for members to get their round of trap in, we are now going to use the battery-operated trap instead of the trap house. I have placed white markers in front of the trap stations to shoot from, five birds from each station. Set the trap to the wobble position. Once you start to shoot for score, the next 25 birds count. No practice birds, no mulligans for misfires, no redos for forgetting to take the safety off, etc. You will need to bring a 50 ft extension cord with you to get the foot switch back far enough. It will be easier if you have a second person to pull and score for you- but not necessary. If you have any questions feel free to call me. There is plenty of time to still buy targets and shoot them before the end of the year. **Rich Williams** 763-546-0313

Vice President's Notes: Kim Frick



Well, this is already July and though it is very hot and sometimes buggy at the range, cooler weather and a change of season is on the way. Even though there are plenty of matches and the Rendezvous to come, there is another very important event that is approaching faster than anyone would like – the **Federal, State and local elections are November 6th**

and a little over three months away. I can hear the groans from everyone already- tired of the endless political commercials- but this is, in fact, a very important election. It will determine the direction and possibly the economic health of our country. It is because of this and the need to put in place local officials that will respect your opinions that you **must be registered to vote.**

The census took place in 2010 and with the counting of the population came redistricting. Minnesota has eight Congressmen, 4 Democratic and 4 Republican. Because there is a limit of 435 members of the house and the population continues to grow, each Congressional Representative has about 700,000 constituents compared to 1800 when each Congressman represented 50,000 people.

Because of this shift upward in the number of citizens represented, the congressional boundaries also shift to encompass approximately the same number of voters in each district. For a rundown of the changes in the districts, read Devin Henry's brief article in the MINNPOST.*

The offshoot of this is that even though you may have voted at the same school or church all your life, this year your polling place may have changed to that of a previously different district. Generally you will be notified that this has happened and advised as to your new polling place, but in the end, it is up to you to be sure you know where you need to go. This year will most likely be a very heavy voter turnout and for your vote to count you must generally be in line to vote by the time the polls close at 8:00, so if you are still driving around looking for your polling place, you could be deprived of your right to vote.

As an American citizen you have a right to vote, but I would argue also an obligation, especially as a veteran I should think would not miss this since it is something you have fought and paid for. You also owe it to yourself and your family to be informed on the candidates and their positions and history. I personally feel voting is very easy, maybe too easy, to select a name from a list without having any idea who the person is or what they represent. Your knowledge of the candidates may help others if they ask you about voting. In any case, GET OUT THERE AND VOTE!

GRRC Hosts USPSA Range Officer Course



On June 23rd and June 24th, Gopher Rifle & Revolver Club hosted a USPSA/NROI Level 1 Range Officer Course. Flying in from Newark, New Jersey, was Master Range Officer Instructor George Jones, to teach this entry level range officer course.

The very extensive course covered every thing a range officer needs to know to safely "run" shooters through a USPSA course of fire. In order to pass the course the range officer was required to demonstrate in a written test knowledge of the USPSA rules governing USPSA matches as well as demonstrate the ability to both be a primary range officer timing the individual shooter as well as score after each shooter participated.

MN DNR: Invasive Buckthorn

Controlling seedlings or small buckthorn plants

For individual plants:

If less than 3/8 inch in diameter, remove by hand. Small seedlings can be pulled and will not re-sprout. If greater than 3/8 inch, use a hand tool that pulls the shrub out, such as a "Weed Wrench" or "Root Talon". The "Weed Wrench" comes in four different sizes and will remove buckthorn stems up to 2.5 inches in diameter. The "Root Talon" removes buckthorn stems up to 1 inch in diameter. Removing by hand is easier if the soil is moist.

Before you pull or dig buckthorn out of your soil, Contact Gopher State One Call (1-800-252-1166) to ensure there are no buried utilities in the area. Be aware of minimizing soil disturbance and tap soil and plants back into place after pulling plants.

If pulling individual plants is impractical

Spray foliage of short buckthorn or seedlings with a herbicide. Glyphosate (one brand name is Roundup) will kill all actively

growing vegetation on which it is sprayed. Triclopyr will kill broad-leaf plants and will not harm grasses when applied properly.

Controlling large buckthorn

Buckthorn plants that are two inches in diameter or larger, are best controlled by cutting the stem at the soil surface and then cover or treat the stump to prevent re-sprouting. This can be effectively done with hand tools (for a few plants), chain saws or brush cutters. If only cutting a few stumps they can be covered with a tin can or black plastic to prevent re-sprouting. Otherwise, stumps should be treated immediately after cutting (within 2 hours) with a herbicide containing Triclopyr (such as Ortho Brush-B-Gon or Garlon 3A or 4) or Glyphosate (Roundup) to prevent re-sprouting.

The best time to cut and chemically treat the stumps is in late summer and throughout the fall. Avoid treating buckthorn in May and June when the tree is putting out leaves as the herbicide will be less effective at this time than during the rest of the year. Herbicides can be applied to cut stumps with a paint-brush, wick applicator or a low volume sprayer. When using water-soluble herbicide products like Ortho Brush-B-Gon, Garlon 3A, or any of the Glyphosate products, treat only the cut surface. When using oil-based products like Garlon 4 or Pathfinder II, treat the cut surface and the remaining bark to the ground line. In cases where more than a few plants are treated, add an indicator dye (available where pesticides are sold) to the herbicide to mark cut stumps you have sprayed. Colored flags can also help mark cut stumps. When buckthorn is cut, the stumps are easily covered and lost under cut brush.



Chemical treatment in the winter

Buckthorn can be treated throughout the fall and winter. Follow herbicide label instructions regarding temperatures at which the herbicide can be applied. Water-soluble herbicides like glyphosate (Roundup, Rodeo, etc.) or triclopyr amine (Garlon 3A, Brush-B-Gone, etc.) can be applied to cut stumps when the temperature is above freezing (32 deg. F). Oil-based products of triclopyr ester (Garlon 4, Pathfinder II) can be applied when the temperature is below freezing (below 32 deg. F).

For basal stem treatment, a method that applies chemical through the bark, low volume spray applications can be made with Garlon 4 and similar oil-based products. This application method uses Triclopyr ester mixed with an oil diluent (i.e. Bark Oil Blue, kerosene or diesel oil) applied directly to the bark of buckthorn from the root collar up about 12-18 inches. This treatment works best on stems less than 2-3 inches in diameter. An ultra low volume spray wand should be used to minimize herbicide use and reduce the potential for non-target injury. Buckthorn treated in this fashion can be left standing or cut at a later date.

M1 FOR VETS CMP Military Rifle Match



July 14, 2012 at the G.R.R.C. Recreation Area,
5180 450th St, Harris, MN 55032

Sight-in starts at 8:00 am, shooting starting at 9:30

Take I-35 north from Twin Cities to the Co. Road 10 interchange at Harris, MN (exit 152, 4 miles north of North Branch, 16 miles so. of Pine City). Go west on 10 about ½ mile. Turn north on Co. 61 (Falcon Ave.), go north 1.2 miles, turn left at the “T”, the gate is about 100 yards west, on the right side. (North).

ELIGIBILITY: Competition open to any eligible competitor you need not be a member of the NRA, CMP or the GRRC. All competitors must have a notarized “Eligibility Affidavit and Liability Agreement” on file with GRRC or present at registration. Must be 18 years of age or older and a citizen of the United States. Persons under the age of 18 must have an adult on the range at all times.

RULES: Current CMP rules will govern throughout. To download a current copy of the rules: <http://www.odcmp.com/Competitions/Rulebook.htm>

TARGETS: The 200yd SR target will be used.

PIT SERVICE: All Competitors will score and pull targets.

MATCH SCHEDULE: Both Match 1 & 2 will follow CMP course A at 200yds. Prone Slow Fire 5 sighters, 10 record shots in a time limit of 15 minutes. Standing to prone Rapid Fire, 10 shots in a time limit of 80 seconds. Standing Slow Fire, 10 shots, single loaded in a time limit of 10 minutes. Match 2 will start approximately 15 minutes after the completion of Match 1.

AWARDS: CMP Achievement Pins will be awarded as per cut scores listed in the rules.

ENTRY FEE: \$15 per match. All entry fees go directly to the M1 for Vets. Club M1's available but must use club ammo at \$0.50/round.

Lunch is included with the match fee and will be available to all guests starting at 11:30 am.

July 2 begins the most important 26-day period for our Second Amendment freedoms in recent history. Representatives from many of the world's socialist, tyrannical and dictatorial regimes have gathered at United Nations headquarters in New York for a month-long meeting, in which they'll put the finishing touches on an international **Arms Trade Treaty** that could seriously restrict your freedom to own, purchase and carry a firearm. Specifically, the U.N. wants to implement international gun registration requirements, bans on commonly owned firearms, tracking and registration of ammunition purchases, and create a new U.N. gun control bureaucracy. Common, or European buckthorn, and glossy buckthorn are the two non-native invasive buckthorn species found in Minnesota. Common buckthorn was first brought here from Europe in the mid-1800s as a popular hedging material. It escaped and became a nuisance plant, forming dense thickets in forests, yards, parks, and roadsides. It crowded out native plants and displaced the native shrubs and small trees in the mid-layer of the forest where many species of birds nested. Today, common buckthorn is found in nearly every Minnesota county, even though the sale, transport, and movement of these plants is prohibited.

Glossy buckthorn, also from Europe, has been sold by the nursery trade in two different forms. The cultivar *Frangula alnus 'Columbaris'* is narrow and tall; the cultivar *Frangula alnus 'Asplenifolia'* spreads up to 10 feet and has narrow leaves that give it a fern-like texture.
