Red Shed Report

Are you looking for a way to earn your two workday credits for 2010? Can you drive a riding lawn mower? Or, can you push a lawn mower? How good are you with a string trimmer or brush cutter? Can you pull on a rake? If you can do any of these things then we have a job for you. With all of the rain lately we are having trouble keeping up with cutting the grass on the KD range. We would like to form a group of people that would be willing to mow, weed whip or rake up the grass once a week at each yard line. We want to spread the work out amongst a lot of people so that nobody gets burned out and you can complete the task in an hour or two.

Here is a general list of what need to be done:

1. Cut the top of each yard line with a riding mower.
2. Cut the sides of the yard line with a push mower where it is too steep for the riding mower.
3. Weed whip the areas around the yard lines that are too steep to cut with a push mower.
4. Brush cut the stuff in front of the 200 and 300 yard lines.
5. Weed whip the position numbers on the yard lines.
6. Cut the parking lot areas with a riding lawn mower.
7. Weed whip around the trees in and near the parking lot areas

The club owns both riding and push mowers for use on the KD range. The only tools that the club doesn't own are weed whips and brush cutters, so if you want to do those jobs you will have to bring your own. The only other requirement is that we need to do this work once a week until October. Its amazing how fast stuff grows up there. 2010 Quigley Shoot in Forsyth MT Draws 631



Every Fathers Day weekend for 20 years the Forsyth Rifle and Revolver Club in Forsyth MT puts on the Matthew Quigley Shooting Match. The Quigley match is billed as the biggest shooting event in Montana since Custer's last stand. This year 631 shooters were challenged by tornadoes, rain and high wind. Practice sessions in the week preceding the match were tested by 15 – 25 mph winds, with gusts up to 55.

The picture above is of 2010 winner **Dr. Keith Lay** of Mississippi and friend- GRRC's own **Bruce Aune**. 2010 was the second time Keith has taken first place prize, and the second time Bruce has been his spotter. At Sunday's awards presentation, an unusual fact was shared with the shooters: the largest number of shooters at the match was from Montana, second was Wyoming, and third was Minnesota.

The signature target at the Quigley match is a bucket-shaped gong that is about 20" X 24" and is shot at off-hand. I was spotting for Bruce when he hit the bucket 6 out of 8 times. Anyone who shoots off- hand at 350 yards can appreciate this accomplishment.

International Benchrest Shooters

This will be a 4 target aggregate match in both LG & HG, 8 targets total and hosted by the Gopher Rifle and Revolver Club (GRRC)

Sight-in Wednesday September 1

Match will be Thursday, Friday, Saturday September 2-4

Membership in IBS, NBRSA or Williamsport required; bring your current membership card. The 1000 yard firing line is concrete, faces north, handicap assessable and contains 20 covered concrete benches with single carrier pits that will be staffed during the Nationals.

GRRC is hosting ten IBS matches this year in addition to the Nationals: Matches 1 and 2 on May 29, Matches 3-6, June 26/27, Matches 7-10 and our MN state matches on Aug 14/15 as well as the 1000 Yard Nationals, Sept 1-4. GRRC hosts organized events in multiple disciplines weekly.

The fees for Nationals are discounted 10% if received prior to preregistration cutoff of 8/16/2010. The discounted fees for one gun, either LG or HG is \$120, both LG and HG will be \$180. Juniors receive a 50% discount LG or HG is \$60, for both LG and HG is \$90. The fees include the Match fees, Friday Night cook-out, Pit Labor, MN Sales Tax and the IBS Match Fees. GRRC does reserve the right to reduce the number of targets based on conditions. **Your registration must be received on or before 9/1/2010. Natural Point of Aim and Calling Your Shots

The following article was submitted by Tom Torborg, and written by **MN Service Rifle Team Member Larry Weidell**.

When I started writing this article about Natural Point of Aim, I received two gun magazines that same month that had like stories. Is it great minds thinking alike? A message that needs repeating? Of course, they said it a little differently than I do, but the message is the same. When target shooting I feel that there are two things that help the shooter put shots into the center of the target. The first and most important is **natural point of aim (NPA)**. The second item that the shooter needs to do is call the **shot**.

Simply stated "when naturally pointing at your target, the probability of getting a good shot is improved." If you are holding the rifle in such a way that you have to use muscle to hold the sights on target, twisting in one direction or another as an example, is referred to "muscling the shot." The tendency is for the rifle to move to the NPA. While shooting in the standing position and the rifle hangs to one side of the target in this case on the right side of the target, and you force the rifle to the left, even a little bit, the shot usually ends up on the right side of the bull. Building a good position is key to a good NPA. When you are not pointing at the target—move. Imagine the rifle in a vise. If it is not pointing at the target, you don't pull on the barrel to get the sights on target. You loosen the vice and position the rifle so it is pointing at the target.

I have talked with shooters that after twenty shots in the prone position the arm with the sling attached hurts. After discussion, it's discovered that when the shooter was in position and relaxes the front sight falls below the target. The competitor is not taking advantage of what the sling has to offer. The shooter is using muscle to lift the rifle to obtain the sight picture and after twenty shots, an aching arm. This often leads to vertical stringing of shots with most of the shots below the bull. The shots are going where the rifle points at rest. So what to do? Some shooters add a few clicks of elevation. Then after a couple of shots, they adjust their position and now all of the shots are going high. What I prefer to do is dig in with my toes and slide rearward on my belly with my elbow remaining in place. I have found that I need to move as little as an inch to get good alignment. You are pivoting on your left elbow for a right handed shooter. This raises the front sight. If the front sight moves above the target, all you need to do is slide forward slightly while keeping your elbow in place.

Ok, now that the sight is at the right height but it is off to the right or left. Instead of muscling the rifle to align the sights move your hips. You can also fine tune your position by moving your left hand forward or back, or moving a leg slightly left or right. Finally, when grasping the pistol grip or stock with the right hand ensure that it doesn't change your NPA. The key is finding the technique that works for you. The desired result is achieved when you relax the sights are aligned with the target, you close your eyes, take a breath, let it out to your respiratory pause, and the sights remain aligned. Now concentrate on trigger control until you break the shot. Be careful though as being too aggressive on the trigger can throw a shot from the X ring to the seven ring. A good NPA holds true for all positions. Once you get into position, relax, and see if the sights are aligned. If they are not aligned with your target adjust/move your position so your NPA is aligns with your target.

The second item that the shooter needs to do is call the shot. So how does calling shots help you? When calling your shots, you focus on your approach to breaking the shot. You may find you have been staring at the sights for too long to call the shot because the sights are blurry or the sights are wobbling too much. At that point, you stop, take a breath,

and start over rather than rushing to get the shot off. If the sights tend to hold in one direction, you move to have a better NPA. If the shot is not on call, did you miss a wind change, are your sights set right, is your NPA good? This is a skill the competitor develops. It provides you instant feedback on your performance. The highly skilled shooter can tell you the exact placement of the shot and if it is not on call, the shooter adjusts the sights or position accordingly.

When calling the shot out the right and it is somewhere else on the target you adjust your sights. When you call it out the right and it ends up out the right, you may need to adjust your NPA. I scored for a competitor once during one of many matches and after breaking the shot, he grumbled. He was shooting this particular rifle for the very first time. It came up as an X. I asked what was wrong with the shot. He said he called an 8 at 4 o'clock. He adjusted the sights I am guessing about two minutes up and two minutes left. He then followed up that X with a ten. I think he only dropped four points for the ten shot string and didn't adjust his sights after the first shot. I have called a center shot and had the shot come up out the right. Low and behold, I was a full revolution off my no wind zero. Other times I have called center shots only to find I missed the wind change and the result was a shot out the left or right. I have seen a shooter after shooting a rapid fire string say there are two shots at 10 o'clock. Sure enough, when the target came up it was a 98 with two shots in the 9 ring, right on call. Maybe he got a little heavy on the trigger, or didn't settle in after the prior shot and shot too soon, there is any number of reasons.

During team shooting, the coach is depending on you to provide feed back so he or she can give you and your team mate sight corrections for wind changes. If you can't provide a good call for a shot, you need to say so otherwise the coach would make a sight correction when not needed. Ultimately, once you develop your skill at calling the shot you should be able to be able to call a ten at 9 o'clock or a nine at 4 o'clock and the spotted shot is on call.

MN Hunting Rules Adapted for Handicapped Sporters



Many Minnesotans enjoy hunting for the thrill of discovery and to enjoy Minnesota's resplendent outdoors. To make hunting more accessible, people with certain physical disabilities—such as those requiring the use of crutches, a wheelchair, or bottled oxygen—are **exempt from some hunting regulations**, such as restrictions on using a crossbow and shooting from a motor vehicle. To qualify for one of the special permits for hunters with disabilities, you and your doctor need to fill out a hunting permit application, available online or from the DNR Information Center.

Greetings everyone. I hope you all have been out shooting and participating in GRRC events. What I would like to talk about today is an upcoming event. I would like to talk about our

Subgun Shoot and Show. The Subgun Shoot and Show will be held in conjunction with our **Annual Picnic on Sunday Sept. 5th.** It will be held in the morning before the picnic.

Now you might be wondering, what is a Subgun Shoot and Show? The Subgun Shoot and Show is an event in which Gopher members can bring their legally registered Submachine Guns to the range to shoot, show and share with other Gopher members. This gives the opportunity for people who might not ever get a chance to shoot or experience a real fully automatic weapon. We are restricting the shooting to Submachine guns as to keep the noise levels down (Submachine guns use pistol calibers only). Members with rifle caliber full-autos can bring them for display purposes only.

Gopher members with legal submachine guns who want to shoot but do not wish to share with others can do so (but we always encourage sharing). **GRRC members who bring submachine guns must show paperwork and tax stamp to event chairperson for verification or it will not be allowed on the range. A range safety officer will control the line at all times.** Only factory new ball style ammunition (FMJ) will be used (no reloads, aluminum or steel cased ammo) and it will be the responsibility of the shooter to provide it. We will have ammunition for sale for people who forget to bring their own. I will provide ammunition free to any of our neighbors who wish to participate (neighbors are all ways invited to our picnic). The owner of the subgun has the right to refuse anyone who they think might have issues firing the weapon.

The shoot will be held on the pistol range with bowling pins as the targets. We will have a sign-up sheet to see what kind of numbers we can expect. So, calling all Gopher members who have legal machine guns and want to participate. Not everyone reads the newsletter (or comes to meetings for that matter) so please mention this to every member you talk to. If you have a legal machine gun and want to participate (subguns to shoot and everything else for display) call me at 763-458-4101.

So far, here are the participants and what they have to share. Rick Loye (myself) a WWII Thompson Submachine Gun (45 ACP) and a Smith & Wesson Model 76 Submachine Gun (9mm). Joyce Borchardt from Bullseye Range (if her schedule allows) has a H&K MP5, a Colt M16 Style Submachine Gun and a MK 760 Submachine Gun (all of these are 9mm). Maybe Joyce will bring her other machine guns for display? We really could use some more, so please get the word out.

GRRC Juniors are on their way to Camp Perry for the 3P Competitions. Three-Position Air Rifle Shooting is the most popular and fastest growing form of shooting sports competition for youth of high school age or younger. Two different Three-Position Air Rifle events are available. Precision Air Rifle is modeled after Olympic-style shooting and allows the use of specialized target rifles and equipment. Sporter Air Rifle is designed for new competitors or those who desire to compete with a minimum of equipment and expense. In both types of shooting, competitors fire at targets at a distance of 10 meters in three different positions, prone, standing and kneeling. Sporter and precision air rifle classes may also be combined into one “open” class. Three-Position Air Rifle provides young competitors with competitive shooting sports opportunities that can be offered on a wide variety of easily accessible or easily constructed ranges, with equipment that is commonly available at affordable costs.
